SCHOOL NOTES

It will come as no surprise to regular readers of these notes to be told that the building of the new school which would enable a comprehensive system of education to start in Shaftesbury has again been postponed. In reply to a letter from the Headmaster asking when a start could be made, since the agreed date of 1976 was now obviously impossible, the County Education Officer said that no firm date could be given since all secondary replacement projects were deferred following the Chancellor's statement in December 1973 and no further information had since been issued. It seems a very long time since the project was first discussed in 1963.

Nevertheless, within the limits of their authority the Governors have done a great deal to improve the conditions within the existing school buildings. New cloak-rooms, a drying room and a boot room for boarders have been taken into use. Fifth Form boarders have a very comfortable day-room, and rooms formerly used by resident maids - a vanished species - have been converted to provide a sitting room and bedroom for a bachelor master and two more Sixth Form study-bedrooms. The former maids' bathroom has been converted into a bath-and-shower room for visiting referees and non-resident masters taking games. The old boot room has been transformed into a Careers and Interview Room. The L.E.A. have lent us yet another temporary class-room, so that during the year we can convert another of the old class-rooms into a boarders' day-room - this time for the Fourth Form.

The school lost a very good friend and wise counsellor on the death of Mr. I. M. Bankes-Williams, who had been a member of the Governing Body since May, 1963. As an ex-Housemaster of Harrow School and Headmaster of Wellington School, Somerset, his knowledge of school affairs in general and appreciation of the problems facing this school were invaluable. In addition he was gifted with a grand sense

of humour, which cheered many a Governors' Meeting. He will be sorely missed. In his place the Diocesan Council of Education appointed Mrs. J. Kirby, wife of I. Kirby (O.S.).

There has been only one change on the Staff this year. Mr. R. Strong, master in charge of Music, resigned in December and was succeeded by Mr. J. Ballam.

As a result of Shaftesbury's twinning with Brionne some very successful exchanges have been made by junior boys with their French counterparts. It is to be hoped that this will become a regular feature of school life, with more boys participating.

We are very grateful to Mrs. Bankes-Williams, who in accordance with an expressed wish of her late husband, allowed us to select books for the School Library from Mr. Bankes-Williams' extensive collection, and to the Vicar and P.C.C. of Motcombe who gave us some pews from their church, which we have adapted and fixed for seating in the gallery in Chapel. Our thanks go also to those Old Boys and friends of the school who have sent donations for the Library and the Chapel.

We offer our congratulations to S. M. Laycock on being appointed Head of School and S. McKie on being appointed Senior Boarder: to A. J. Williams on being selected again for the Dorset Schools Association Football XI: to S. D. Mawdsley, Exhibitor of Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, on being awarded a further Scholarship to attend Freiburg University: to C. I. Goodchild and S. McKie on their places at Emmanuel College and Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge: to T. Godeseth of St. Edmund Hall, Oxford, on being awarded First Class Honours in the Honours School of Natural Science: to P. Smart, of the R.M.A. Sandhurst, on being awarded the Queen's Medal for best student officer, the Brian Phillpots prize for War Studies, the R.E.M.E. prize, and the Narrien Cup, awarded to the top cadet in the Academic Order of Merit - a record performance according to our Schools' Liaison Officer: also at Sandhurst to A. Whitley on being awarded his Rugby Colours and to A. J. Trevis on playing Association Football for the Academy: and finally to Mr. P. J. Rolfe, our Senior English Master, on being awarded the Kenneth Allsop Memorial Essay prize.

A DAY ON THE FARM

We discovered fruit-grafting and admired the great variety of flowering shrubs. The sight of beds covered with black plastic, with many tiny seedlings appearing through holes, astounded us, but we were told that this system eliminated the need for weeding and watering. Perhaps this is the gardening of the future. We saw straight-stemmed carnations growing through wire frames and a collection of tropical plants in a specially heated greenhouse.

All too soon it was time to leave, but we shall remember the trip as a highlight of the school year.

A WEEK AT BRIONNE

We arrived at the Town Hall very tense and excited on that Tuesday morning, and after only a short wait for the coach which was to take us to Southampton docks, we left at about 9 o'clock. Brionne, and others to nearby villages or towns. I don't doubt that everyone was glad to sink into his bed late that Tuesday night.

During the rest of the week we forgot England, for a little while at least, and enjoyed a small taste of the French way of life: the mouth-watering meals; the warm embracing French hospitality; their generosity and friendship. We were shown the sights of Brionne and the surrounding district by our hosts: the old, weather-worn remains of the Brionne castle, with its beautiful view of the town and of the narrow valley; the literally breathtaking tower and the motor museum at the Bec-Hellouin; and some were even taken to Paris for a day out. Two interesting group visits were made to nearby factories. On the first trip we were taken to a cheese factory which was situated a few miles out of Brionne, and we were shown all the various processes that were gone through in order to make and mature the delicious cheeses; also, after our trip had been concluded, they very kindly presented us each with a small cheese. The second trip that was arranged was a visit to the Brionne cotton factory, in which baby's clothing was made. A number of dances were arranged and we all enjoyed ourselves very much indeed.

First XI

Even in losing the opening match 1—3 at Sexey's the team played confidently and there was much to be pleased about. Always there was the feeling that once the early-season uncertainty had been dispelled, if this XI had been able to put a few results together they might have finished the season with a creditable record. As it was, we always seemed very much 'under pressure'.

Strange this, for the back-four defenders were as skilful as any we have had for some years and certainly more aggressive and determined than most. Toogood dominated the centre by powerful heading and strength in the tackle; Palmer rapidly developed into a 'class' fullback; Glaze tackled fiercely and attacked well up his left flank; and Spencer's ability to read the game and his speed and decision made him an ideal sweeper. Gray in goal was in remarkable form at times but just occasionally failed to come for the high crosses in the six-yard area and left us gaping.

Where the side proved to be lacking was in midfield, where we could produce no consistent ball-winner and, far more fundamental to the team's performance, little "screen" in front of the main defenders, who were thus often outnumbered and terribly vulnerable from shots from the edge of the penalty area. As the season progressed our defenders tended increasingly to lie back awaiting the next inevitable onslaught instead of closing up the game and keeping it compact. It was sad indeed to see such promising young players as Palmer and Glaze hustled so mercilessly by Bournemouth into quite uncharacteristic errors.

But a greater problem even than this was the inability of the midfield and forward players to develop any teamwork. Individually they often worked very hard and put effort into their game, but support for the man with the ball, anticipation of the run of the game by running into spaces early or marking opponents, producing cover at the back, collective enthusiasm in attack, were all vital aspects of the game we could not seem to cultivate. Our opponents, on the other hand, invariably hunted about the pitch in packs of three and four, helping each other—"running for each other" to quote the current jargon—but somehow we could not do this.

It was not through unfitness or lack of stamina. It is tempting to write it down to a lack of "feel" for the game. If this were so, would it not apply equally to the other S.G.S. XI's? Or is it just less apparent in the 2nd, Under 15 and Colts XI's, where the pace of the game is less severe?

A. J. Williams, a midfield player of some ability currently in the County under 19 team, found life very difficult. C. Wilkinson on the right wing had a very good season; always ready to take on a defence, he could be relied upon to provide a steady stream of accurate crosses. Seldom did we have a forward up anxious to convert them. Indeed, it became necessary to draft Deacon into the centre-forward position to show some aggression in front of goal. Our defeat of Gillingham was largely a result of his efforts.

Second XI

It is always pleasant to win the last game of the season, especially when it is only the second win. However, probably our best game was earlier in the season against Weymouth Grammar School. ATHLETICS

For all but the last fortnight of term, we had gorgeous weather for athletics. The Five Star Award Scheme got under way early and thirty-eight boys managed to achieve Decathlon Awards, six of them getting the highest honour of Five Star Awards. In this competition the school amassed the magnificent total of 10,769 points, with Spartans winning the Veale Cup from Trojans with a total of 2,940 points.

By far the best individual success of the season was the performance of Neil Johnstone in the North Dorset, the Dorset, and the S.W. England Schools A.A. Championships, culminating in his selection for the Dorset team in the All England Schools Championships at Shrewsbury. To achieve selection Johnstone ran the 200m easily within the required National Standard time of 24.7 seconds. His best performance during the term was 23.4 seconds.

At the North Dorset Sports, we entered a nearly complete team in the Junior Boys and some others competed individually in the Intermediate Boys age group. Notable achievements were N. Johnstone's easy win in the 200m, P. Deacon's win in the 3000m and the relay team's second place (N. Johnstone, S. Dennis, M. Hollingshead and N. Wilkinson). Johnstone and Deacon were both selected to represent North Dorset in the Dorset Sports but subsequently only Johnstone went on to higher achievements.

Then came the rain in the last fortnight of term. Day One of the two-day School Sports was in fact dry, but overcast, and all events were assisted or hampered by strong winds. On the second day (Tuesday, July 2nd) it poured, but the Sports continued and five records were broken!

On Old Boys Day it was announced that the school was to be presented with the Olympic torch carried by an Old Boy, Duncan Vaughan, on the last lap to Wembley Stadium in the 1948 Olympiad. He died later from polio. His mother very kindly presented the torch and Neil Johnstone accepted it on behalf of the school and ran a lap of honour, carrying the torch, in memory of Duncan.
